Genres & Formats	<ul> <li>Realistic Fiction <ul> <li>Means real; it could happen.</li> <li>Fiction means it's made up.</li> <li>Made-up characters but look and act like real people.</li> <li>Made-up place/setting but could really exist.</li> <li>Made-up problem that could happen; it's possible.</li> <li>Often includes some factual information.</li> <li>Often funny.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Fantasy Fiction <ul> <li>Means make believe, imaginary; it could not happen.</li> <li>Made-up characters and problems that could <i>not</i> exist in real life.</li> <li>Characters are silly and/or imaginary (e.g., animals talk and wear clothes).</li> <li>Made-up place/setting that does not exist (e.g., magical places or objects).</li> <li>Made-up problem that would never happen; it's impossible.</li> <li>May include some factual information.</li> <li>Often funny.</li> </ul></li></ul>	<ul> <li>Limerick: A funny, 5-line poem that follows an AABBA rhyme pattern.</li> <li>Acrostic: A poem where the first letter of each line spells out a word vertically.</li> <li>Colorful Concrete: A poem that takes the shape of its subject.</li> <li>Sensory Poem: A poem that describes something using the five senses.</li> <li>Haiku: A 3-line poem that follows a pattern of syllables: 5-7-5 respectively.</li> <li>Narrative Poems: A complete story that is told in poem form.</li> </ul>
