3 TYPES OF STORY **Problems**



Identify WHO the main character is upset with. It may be one character or multiple. It may be a human or an animal (e.g., realistic, fantasy).

TEXT EXAMPLES

Identify WHAT the main character wants but can't have. It may be a physical object (e.g., missing, broken, not working). It may be a situation (e.g., weather, not invited to a party, something is not fair, etc.).

Identify WHY the main character is struggling.
These are problems within the character; he is his own problem. They may be related to his choices (e.g., negative behavior, poor attitude) or his feelings (e.g., fear, quilt).



3 TYPES OF STORY **Solutions**



Identify WHO helped the main character. Another character helps to solve the problem (e.g., rescues from danger, offers advice or warning, provides resources or support, etc.).





Identify WHY the main character feels better—he changed his attitude, he altered his behavior, time passes, the situation evolves or resolves.







LITERAL PROBLEM: Humpty Dumpty became afraid of heights after he fell from the wall.



LITERAL SOLUTION: He faced his fears and forced himself to go up the ladder to retrieve his airplane.









LITERAL PROBLEM: Camilla denied liking lima beans and ended up with a bad case of stripes.







LITERAL PROBLEM: Farmer Brown's cows and hens typed a note refusing to work unless they were given electric blankets.



LITERAL SOLUTION: Farmer Brown traded the electric blankets to the cows and hens for the typewriter so they would give milk and eggs again.








LITERAL PROBLEM: The city was without rain for three weeks.



LITERAL SOLUTION: The rain finally came and everyone went into the street rejoicing with renewed energy.




Stanley felt someone touch his shoulder. "I was just coming to get you," said Larry Finchfeather.

"I promise!"








LITERAL PROBLEM: Stanley realized he mixed up Crazy Hair Day and Picture Day.



LITERAL SOLUTION: Larry, his classmate, told Stanley that the class picture wouldn't be the same without him and convinced the class to have crazy hair, too.








LITERAL PROBLEM: Dex wanted to be a superhero, but Cleevis and other neighborhood animals made fun of him for being so little.






LITERAL PROBLEM: When she took out her purse in the middle of class, Mr. Slinger took it away, and she got angry.






LITERAL SOLUTION: Lilly realized she was wrong and apologized the next day with a new picture and story. Mr. Slinger forgave her for the mean note.

The girl tosses it aside and gives it another go.







LITERAL PROBLEM: A little girl and her dog tried to make a magnificent thing (a sidecar) and failed.







LITERAL PROBLEM: Louis interrupted others.



LITERAL SOLUTION: Louis' mother taught him a breathing technique to prevent him from interrupting.









LITERAL PROBLEM: The kids on the bus made fun of Unhei's hard-to-pronounce Korean name.



LITERAL SOLUTION: Unhei's classmate Joey helped her see how important her name and heritage are.








LITERAL PROBLEM: Mean Jean was a bully to the other kids on the playground at recess.







LITERAL PROBLEM: Penelope, the dinosaur, could not resist eating her human classmates.
