














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### READERS SUMMARIZE INFORMATION



### SKILL PURPOSE

More than just recalling individual details about a text, readers must infer the **most important** information and the big ideas. This requires the *Thinking Voice* to **summarize** after reading.

However, as texts get longer, readers recognize the value in stopping after each **section** during reading to execute a mini-summary. This aids their overall comprehension and helps them to determine the text's







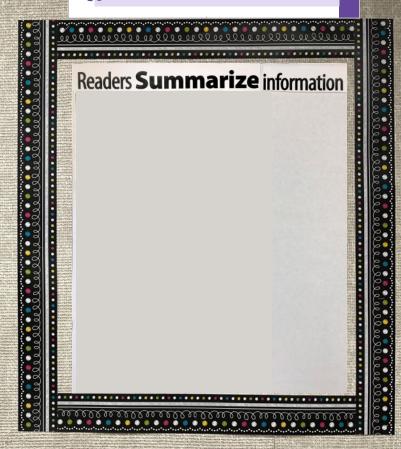
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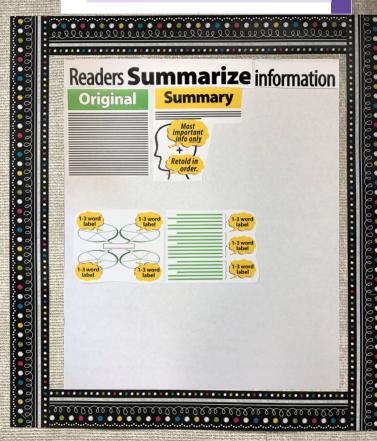
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### READERS SEE TEXT ORGANIZATION



### SKILL PURPOSE

An author organizes his text to help a reader navigate the information.

Text features are visible tools an author may include to help a reader
find specific information quickly, better understand the information, or
to add more information beyond what was stated in the main text.

**Text structure** is the invisible organization of the sentences and paragraphs. An informational-text author uses one of six organizational patterns to help the reader follow his ideas from beginning to end.







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
